About the Hospital



Robert E. Bush Naval Hospital, commissioned on July 9, 1993, is a state-of-the-art, 160,000 square foot facility. The architectural firm who designed the hospital was awarded the Secretary of Defense's "Excellence in Design" award for a medical facility in 1994. The hospital contains 30 beds and has room to expand to 40. The hospital has an Emergency Medical Department, three operating rooms, a Multi-Service Ward for inpatient care and in the spring of 2003 will have seven newly constructed Labor, Delivery, Recovery, Postpartum (LDRP) suites. The hospital also has a modern full-service Pharmacy, Laboratory, Radiology Department and a Physical Therapy Clinic.

Medical specialties available include Family Practice, Pediatrics, Obstetrics/Gynecology, General Surgery, Internal Medicine, Orthopedics, Optometry and Mental Health Services.



About the Area

Twentynine Palms

A community of about 28,000 including the Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center's population of about 14,000, modern-day desert dwellers, Twentynine Palms community and business district is about five miles south of the Combat Center's main gate. Southwest travelers know this growing oasis in the Morongo Basin as a gateway to the scenic 558,000-acre Joshua Tree National Park, and as a restful stopover on State Highway 62 between Los Angeles and the aquatic playground areas of the Colorado River.

Reasonable land prices, clean air, modern conveniences, golf courses and parks, plus aviation facilities and pleasant year-round living conditions are among enticements that draw new residents to Twentynine Palms. A large, continually-expanding medical center and seven schools, including two colleges, are marked indicators of the area's growth. Hot, arid summers and invigorating but mild winters in Twentynine Palms mark the location as a mecca for those seeking a healthful climate. Many of the city's residents are retired and former Marines and Sailors.

January days averaging a dry 27 percent humidity, range from a brisk 30 degrees at night to a comfortable 68 degrees during the day. In the spring, mild weather prevails and many High Desert areas are blanketed with beautiful wildflowers. Summer brings lows of 73 degrees and highs climbing to 110 degrees.

Today's townspeople have inherited a history first recorded nearly 130 years ago during the original exploration of what later became Twentynine Palms by Col. Henry Washington. He found Chemehuevi and Serrano Indian tribes living in the surrounding hills and near the spring they called "Marrah", or land of little water, now known as the Oasis of Mara. These tribes, existing since time-unknown, held to their villages even as gold prospectors flowed into the Oasis in the 1870s to camp and replenish water supplies. By 1913, the natives had almost completely disappeared.

It is said Twentynine Palms was named for the number of large, fine palm trees once found in the middle of the Oasis of Mara. The recording of 29 is attributed by various authorities to either Col. Washington or to the gold miners. In the summer of 1885, however, a survey team counted only 26. Notwithstanding, Twentynine Palms is what the modern community is known as today.

From the 1880s to about 1910, gold was discovered and prospectors mined the desert hills near the Oasis, and the mining camps Virginia Dale and Old Dale were established. When

the price of gold fell too low to pay for the high costs of mining and hauling ore from outlying desert areas, the mines shut down and the miners and their families moved away. Mining continued sporadically but ended with the start of World War I, when gold production was curtailed by the government. It revived briefly in the 1930s during the Great Depression when almost all local men found employment in the mines that reopened.

Afar cry from the few World War I homesteaders in 1920, who began to



dot the area with cabins on 160- and 80-acre tracts, Twentynine Palms has now expanded to boundaries enclosing some 495 square miles. it still offers a variety of homes that take advantage of the terrain and natural landscapes, smaller subdivision dwellings and trailer and mobile home parks. Rents and prices of homes in Twentynine Palms are considered reasonable.

Educational needs are served by the Morongo Unified School District, which provides for students in the Twentynine Palms, Yucca Valley, Joshua Tree, Landers, Morongo Valley and Pioneertown areas.

Higher education is available through Copper Mountain Community College, located in nearby Joshua Tree, and a

learning lab and satellite campuses of major colleges and universities at the Combat Center Chapman University, a private institution with its main campus located in Orange County, also operates a High Desert campus.

An ideal location for outdoor recreation enthusiasts, Twentynine Palms offers two beautiful parks, a swimming pool and various sports programs including baseball, basket ball, tennis and golf. Knott's Sky Park, more than 550 individual and group campsites in the Joshua Tree National Park area. The Park's visitor center and headquarters, with excellent tours, exhibits and displays, is located at 74485 National Park Dr. in

Twentynine Palms. Twentynine Palms and its surrounding areas have

much to offer in the way of the good life and peace of mind.

The history of the area can be taken in by a brief visit to the Twentynine Palms Museum. Operated by the Twentynine Palms Historical Society, the museum attempts to retrace the history of the area specifically to the Indians, homesteaders and miners who were the first dwellers of the desert. The museum is located at 6760 National Park Dr., Twentynine Palms. Joshua Tree Village

Joshua Tree, population 6,500, is just 15 miles southwest of the combat center. The town is another entry point to the half-million-acre Joshua Tree National Park and is filled with scenic desert wonders.

With a near-perfect altitude of between 2,500 and 3,500 feet for year-round living, Joshua Tree is 10 degrees cooler than the low desert in summer and 20 degrees warmer than the mountain communities in the winter. Rainfall during the winter and usually in July and August, produces about four inches annually. There are no industries to pollute the air

and water, and the climate encourages healthful living. The clean, dry air is recommended by many doctors.

Two small shopping centers supply Joshua Tree residents with four local physicians, a dentist, beauty shops, barber shops, a county library, a post office and other services. And the town is growing. The Hi-Desert Playhouse Cultural Center and a County Building serve residents.


Residents enjoy good, pure water piped from local wells by the Joshua Basin County Water District. Other services to the community are Southern California Edison for electricity, General Telephone, and in limited areas, Southern California Gas. There is also television reception in most areas.

The town boasts a fine volunteer fire department, and the Joshua Tree Ambulance Association on Park Boulevard provides excellent service to the area.

Joshua Tree has its own modern elementary school and, in the basin area, schools through junior college are available, with bus service.

At the Recreation and Park District, grounds on sunburst Avenue are playgrounds, tennis courts, handball courts and picnic facilities. Community associations, clubs, societies and organizations cover a wide range of interest including rockhounds and arts and crafts groups. The recreation and Park District supplies craft classes for all ages and the Joshua Tree County Library has a good selection of books.

Annual celebrations for the community include the Joshua Tree Turtle Days, during the first weekend of May and a Christmas Pageant two weeks before that holiday. For more information, write: Joshua Tree Chamber of Commerce, PO Box 600, Joshua Tree CA 92252, or call (619) 366-3723.




Joshua Tree National Park

Humans have occupied the area encompassed by Joshua Tree National Park's nearly 800,000 acres for at least 5,000 years. The first group known to inhabit the area was the Pinto Culture, followed by the Serrano, the Chemehuevi, and the Cahuilla. In the 1800s cattlemen drove their cows into the area for the ample grass available at the time and built water impoundments for them. Miners dug tunnels through the earth looking for gold and made tracks across the desert with their trucks.

Homesteaders began filing claims in the 1900s. They built cabins, dug wells, and planted crops.

Each group left its mark upon the land and contributed to the rich cultural history of Joshua Tree National Park. The park protects 501 archeological sites, 88 historic structures, 19 cultural landscapes, and houses 123,253 items in its museum collection.

After the area became a national monument in 1936, local and regional residents were the primary park visitors. As Southern California grew so did park visitation; Joshua Tree now lies within a three-hour drive of more than 18 million people. Since Joshua Tree was elevated from national monument to national park status in 1994 however, greater numbers of visitors from around the nation and the world come to experience Joshua Tree National Park.



Yucca Valley

A thriving, modern community of 18,300 residents, Yucca Valley lies 20 miles southwest of the Combat Center on Highway 62. Situated at an elevation of 3,300 feet, the community offers comfortable summers, sunny winters and a healthy environment.



Yucca Valley offers all of the services and facilities needed for comfortable living and its picturesque desert landscape is profusely dotted with homes ranging from modest to luxurious. Newcomers to the desert community soon recognize the town's namesake, the "Yucca", Spanish for a prolific genus of desert plant that bears white paniced flowers and which can be seen as natural landscaping for many homes.

Yucca Valley's background is mining and cattle. Although there were few mines in the western end of the Greater Morongo Basin, the Twentynine Palms Mining District had many mines, large and small, and Yucca Valley was an important weigh station for the wagons that brought in men and supplies to the mines and carried out gold ore.

During the 1880s, the High Desert became primarily a cattle range, with a number of large cattle companies based in the Banning and Big Bear areas running their herds from Morongo Valley to Twentynine Palms. Warren's Well in Yucca Valley was headquarters for cowboys of the Barker and Shay Ranch, Jim Mart's "I-S" outfit, the Chase and Law Ranch, and the Talmadge brand, all of whose cattle ranged the Hi-Desert in winter. Warren's Well was also the gathering point for the spring and fall cattle roundups until World War II. The last cattle drive stirred the dust through Yucca Valley in 1947.

From the standpoint of population, homesteaders began to move into the Hi-Desert during the 1870s, although many of the early arrivals were squatters who never proved up their claims. By the early 1900s, families were moving into an area from Morongo Valley to Twentynine Palms to file their claims. Following World War I, many disabled veterans came here seeking healthful living conditions. The Homestead Era continued on into the 1950s after the five-acre "jack-rabbit" homesteads became available.

The first subdivisions, laying out of streets and the beginning of a town, were started in 1946. One was in the western end, centering at Pioneertown Road, and the other farther east along Old Woman Springs Road (also known as Victorville Road).


Yucca Valley continued to grow in the years that followed, and today is a modern, progressive community with all the charm of country living.

Pioneertown

Pioneertown was built in 1946 as a movie set for westerns, including the movies of Gene Autry, The Cisco Kid, starring Duncan Renaldo, Annie Oakley starring Gail Davis, Judge Roy Bean with Edgar Buchanan, Range Rider with Jock O. Mahoney, and Buffalo Bill Jr. with Dick Jones. The movie set was to provide a place for the actors to live, and have their house used as part of the movie.

Some of the original investors in the town were Roy Rogers, who also built the Pioneer Bowl, Sons Of The Pioneers, who the town was named after, Dick Curtis, who was a professional villain in old movies, Bud Abbott, Russell Hayden, who played Lucky on the Hopalong Cassidy series, Louella Parsons the Hollywood gossip columnist and Philip N. Krasne: The Man Who Saved Pioneertown.



Palm Springs

While Palm Springs has its share of vacation activities (golf, tennis, hiking and ballooning), perhaps the best reason to travel to the resort city is rest and recuperation.

From a large selection of hotels, you will have ample opportunity to choose one that's quaint and cozy or large and luxurious - whichever suits your vacation plans.

The population of Palm Springs (approximately 42,000) enjoys swimming, as do the frequent visitors to the city, evidenced in the startling statistic of almost one swimming pool for every five residents. However, if your athletic endeavors include golf, there are 60 courses from which to choose. For the tennis player, there are more than 300 courts scattered throughout the community.

Once you're done lounging around the pool or hacking around 18 holes, it's time for lunch. Downtown, you'll stroll amidst aromas of European-style sidewalk cafes intermixed with flavors of neighboring Mexican restaurants. Since you're in town, you can also walk through some of the renowned fashion boutiques and sidewalk shops.

Desert Hot Springs

Desert Hot Springs, city of about 12,000 residents, is a complete health resort, and lies southwest of the Combat Center off State Highway 62, three miles before it meets Interstate 10. It is one of the few locations in the world where a natural underground river of hot mineral water flows near enough to the surface to be tapped. The water temperatures come from the ground at 110 to 207 degrees. It is cooled and kept by thermostat at 102 to 110 degrees, and used for therapy and recreation. The hot mineral waters were enjoyed by the early desert Native Americans for many years.

Indio

Stretching for miles in every direction are groves that make Indio the Date Capital of the United States. It has the largest date garden concentration outside the Near East. Centered in the Coachella Valley, along Interstate 10 at the junction of state highways 86 and 111, Indio is about a 95-minute drive south of the Combat Center. A more scenic though slower route through the Joshua Tree National Park can be taken via the park entry south of Twentynine Palms.

Indio has a population of about 42,000 residents living in single family and apartment units. Its buildings, including public and private schools, are modern, and there is continued construction and expansion. Adult education is offered at College of the Desert in nearby Palm Desert.

The annual Date festival, 10 fun-filled days of Arabian Nights Festivities, is held in Indio each February. Entertainment ranges from camel and ostrich races and the National Horse Show to music, drama and dances.

Indio's elevation is sea level, and the average annual rainfall is under four inches. For a major portion of the year, the climate is very pleasant, with the daylight temperatures averaging in the low 70s. Minimum temperatures reach 40 and summer temperatures reach a little over 100 degrees in the daytime.

A trip to Indio should include a visit to Lake Cahuilla, just south of the city, and to the All-American Canal, which brings water to the valley from the Colorado River and passes along the northwest edge of the city. Indio is on the approach to the hunting, fishing, speedboat races, water-skiing and sailing to be found at the expansive Salton Sea, located 20 miles southeast of the city. Lucerne Valley

At the junction of state highways 247 and 18, northwest of the Combat Center, lies Lucerne Valley, a town of about 9,200 residents. Lucerne Valley is noted as the world's largest "cactus garden", with plants valued at up to \$10,000. It is adjacent to one of the last remaining areas authorized by the Bureau of Land Management for off-road vehicles. Lush and large, the city's Pioneer Park has facilities for tennis, basketball, volleyball, baseball, roller skating and picnicking under beautiful trees. Barbecues and playground equipment are also available. Small but modern, Lucerne Valley's business and shopping center provides all the facilities and services needed. Big Bear



The Big Bear Area, with a population of about 14,100, might be called the mountain's biggest attraction. Covering the region are dozens of resorts and lodges, and scores of trailer / camper locations and marinas. There are also public and private campgrounds with endless hiking and riding trails. Big Bear Lake, popular for winter sports as well as for first-rate fishing during the summer, is more than seven miles long and one and one-half miles wide. Rainbow trout are stocked in the lake each year and fishing is permitted year round. Boats are available for rent at one of the many boat landings or the public launch ramp may be used for private crafts. An excursion steamer operates daily around the lake all summer and in the evenings.

Located in Big Bear is Alpine Slide. A scenic chairlift ride is followed by an exhilarating slide back down through hairpin turns, around curves and along straightaways. This unique feature makes Alpine Slide an attraction not to be missed.

Running Spring with its truly four-season atmosphere is 6,000 feet high, situated in the heart of the San Bernadino Mountains between Big Bear Lake and Lake Arrowhead, and only 20 miles from metropolitan San Bernardino. Located here is an impressive complex of lodges, shops and lifts with supplies and snow equipment available.


